The church was very prettily decorated by the Misses Derham, Barnett, Gamble and Bestock. The report for the year read by Mr H. Barnett, the chu ch steward, showed that good progress had been made. The usual votes of thanks moved in a most happy and appropriate manner by Mr W. C. Barnett and ably seconded by Mr Davey brought the entertainment to a close.
