Falling 64 feet from a fourth floor window at the flour mills of John Darling & Sons Ltd., Albion, George Herbert Dickie, 22, of Evans Street, Braybrook, was killed early on Tuesday morning.

Dickie had commenced work at the mills only three days previously. He was last seen at work on the fourth floor at 1.30 a.m. It is believed he climbed through a window to smoke a cigarette and overbalanced from a 20-inch parapet. His body was found at 5 a.m. by Mr Hyett.

Deceased was the son of Mr and Mrs Robert Dickie and was a well known resident. The funeral, which took place on Wednesday afternoon, left his late residence, the remains being interred in the Fawcner cemetery in the presence of a very large circle of relatives and friends. There was a large collection of floral tributes, among which was a beautiful glass dome and wreath from the Braybrook Football and Cricket clubs, and beautiful wreaths from the staff of W. Pridham Pty. Ltd., employees of W. Pridham Pty. Ltd. and the bus boys. The deceased was a great sport, playing with Braybrook Football Club in the Footscray League. He was also a member of the Braybrook Cricket Club. The coffin was borne to the grave by four brothers, Arch, John, Will and Frank Dickie, Norman Skinner (brother-in-law), Clarrie Taylor (cousin), Cyril Steedman and Mick Breen, whilst the pall was supported by Geo. W. Pridham and A.
