Murder at riverside reconstructed

HOMICIDE detectives believe Norman Hurley, 19, tractor driver, was murdered last Wednesday week, the day he left Sunshine to inspect a truck that had been offered for sale.

Hurley's battered body was found floating in the Maribyrnong River behind the Hill at Flemington racecourse on Sat-

Reconstructing the crime, police say Hurley was waylaid near the racecourse on the night of his disappearance, and taken by at least two men to the lonely northern bank of the river near the Footscray Rowing Club.

There the murderers robbed him, battered his head with an iron bar, dragged him along the bank to a concrete jetty about 40 yards away, and threw him, still alive, into the river.

A post-mortem examination revealed that the body had been in the water about 10 days. Death was directly due to drowning, with a

Police yesterday appealed to the public to bein them trace Hurley's movements last Wednerday week. He may have travelled on buses from Sunshine to Flemington.

Hurley limped with his left leg, and had a slight stoop. He was 5ft sin tall, and had dark brown curly hair and brown eyes. He was wearing a dark overcoat and suit, green pullover, and was hatless.

Hurley was an orphan. His home was at Melton, but he had been boarding with two of his brothers in Sunshine since March. He was employed at the Sunshine Harvester works.

Investigations are being made by a large squad of detectives, including Det-Sgt H. R. Donelly, Sen Dets C. Petty, C. Currer, and F. J. Adam, and Det W. Mooney.

Yesterday they were informed that Hurley had only about £50 in his wallet when he laft home. Previously it was understood that the sum was £400.

His bank book on the State Savings Bank at Meston, which also was missing when the body was found, showed a credr of £156

Criminal Investigation de-partment officers still think Hurley was battered and thrown into the stream while alive by some person, or per-sons, whom he had contacted in connection with his plan to buy a motor truck.

It is believed Hurley was un-acquainted with the lonely locality where, presumably, he was set upon and therefore could easily have been led astray during the negotiations for the purchase of the truck.

Huriey is described as hav-ing been "an honest and de-cent citizen, well liked, and apparently without any member.

Murdered man's bank book missing

DETECTIVES investigating the murder of Norman Hurley, 19, said last night that his bank book as well as his wallet was missing.

He had a credit balance at the State Savings Bank of £167. Deposits included £90 on May 25, when he sold his sports car, and £40 on July 27.

The bankbook was not among Hurley's personal belongings.

Police, who are almost certain that robbery was the motive for the murder, believe there was not more than £50 in his wallet.

Hurley's body was recovered from the Maribyrnong River, near Flemington racecourse, on Saturday. He

had been battered about the head and thrown into the water while still alive.

Working separately, six detectives under Detective Sergeant H. R. Donelly, chief of the Homicide Squad, tried yesterday to trace Hurtey's movements after he left his bearding-house in Sunshine on August 4.

Bus drivers and passengers were in-

terviewed, but none could help the police.

A number of people known to police, who were reported in the district the night of the murder, will be interviewed by detectives today.

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In Murder Hunt

Two clues in the Maribyrnong River murder being investigated today by the Homicide Squad and Flemington detectives are a letter written by the victim. Norman Hurley, the night before his death and a wallet found late yesterday near the Footscray station.

It seems unlikely that the wallet is the one Hurley was carrying when he disappeared.
