FLOODS TRAGEDY. FATHER AND SON DROWNED. OROSSING A SWOLLEN CREEK. A LAD'S MARROW ESCAPE.

A shocking double tragedy occurred at Keilor this morning.

Mr William Mansfield, a well-known farmer, residing in the district, and his son William, a boy seven years of age, were drowned in the Deep Creek.

Mr Mansfeel and his son, together

with a lad named Philip Hill, were driving in a huggy, and in order to reach their destination had to cross the Deep Creek, which was in flood owing to the recent rains.

The father and son were sitting in the front of the vehicle, whilst the lad fill! was in the back seat, and was leading another horse by means of a rope.

Although the creek was very high, Mr Monsfield decided to try and cross

Immediately the vehicle entered the creek, however, it was overturned by the rush of water, and the occupants thrown out.

My Manafield and his son were swopt down the stream, and both were drowned.

The lad Hill was more fortunate. He retained his hold of the rope with which he was leading the estra horse. The asimal swam ashore, rulling Hill after it. The lad, on reaching the bank, was little the worse for his adventure.

Word of the tragndy was sent in to the North Resendon police station, and constable Walsh went out to Kellor. He succeeded in recovering the bodies of Mr Manafield and his son, and comoved them to the Kellor Hotel.

An inquest will be held, probably to-morrow.

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
