

GREYHOUNDS KILLED BY CAR

TWO MEN INJURED

As they were walking along Ballarat Road near the Albion railway gates at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday, with four greyhounds on a leash, two brothers were knocked down by a motor car. Both men were injured, and the dogs, which were valued at £50, were killed.

James Gahan, 30 years of Inglewood, received abrasions to the hand and face; Joseph Gahan, 32 years, married, of Garnet Street, Sunshine, sustained a fractured leg and head injuries.

Joseph Gahan was admitted to the Royal Melbourne Hospital. His brother, after receiving treatment, was allowed to go home.

Accompanied by his brother, James, Joseph Gahan, said that about 7.30 p.m. yesterday he was walking along Ballarat Road, Sunshine, with his racing greyhounds, Laddie Limes, Unslopagass, Mugwumps and a grey pup named Fearless Jury, which had had its first run on Sunday last. The dogs, which were being taken out for an exercise walk, were being led along the road on a leash. Gahan said that he did not see the motor car which knocked him and his brother down. He was rendered unconscious and his brother was badly dazed.

On Tuesday morning Mr John Russell, an employee of Wunderlich Ltd., who lives at Tottenham, was injured when cycling to work. He was struck by a motor truck at the intersection of McIntyre Road and

During the week the letter at the Baptist Church, Sunshine, was rifled, and the matter is in the hands of the police.
