FIRE SPREADS ALONG STREET

We received a call at 5.45, and had the water on at 5.14. The pressure, however, was very had. There was some apprehension that Mikay's offices would catch, but we were fortunate enough to prevent it. The bravery of the firemen was a conspicuous feature of the outbreak.
