3 KILLED AT CROSSING

Father and Son

In the second level-crossing tragedy within two days a man, his son, and a youth were killed on Saturday.

The victims were: John Smith, 49, of Hertford rd., Sunshine; William Smith, 18, same address, his son; Hubert Thornton, 15 years, of Morris st., Sunshine.

The accident occurred when the early morning Daylesford train to Melbourne struck a motor-car with the three victims at Taylors rd. crossing, about 11 miles from St. Albans station, between St. Albans and Sydenham.

The train, which was delayed for nearly an hour, brought Thornton to Melbourne, but he died soon after admittance to Royal Melbourne Hospital. Smith and his son were killed almost instantly. Rifles and cartridges found in the wrecked car indicate that the occupants were going shooting.

The funeral of Mr. Smith and his son will leave their former residence at 1.45 p.m. to-day for the Footscray Cemetery. The funeral of Thornton will leave his home at 3 p.m. to-day for the Footscray Cemetery.

TWO KILLED

Struck by the door of a stationary car which was opened as he passed on his bicycle in Camberwell rd., Camberwell, on June 22, John Thomas White, 61, of Camberwell rd., curator of the Camberwell Cricket-ground, died in a private hospital at Canterbury on Saturday.

Edward Tough, 18, of Mitchell st., Northcote, was killed when a motor-cycle on which he was riding pillion struck a tree in Yarra Bend rd., Fairfield, on Saturday evening. The rider, Leslie Vaisey, 18, of Mitchell st., Northcote, was treated at St. Vincent's Hospital for a leg injury.
