## EXPLOSIVES HUT FIRE

## Man Dies. Four Hurt

Severely burned in the fire yesterday at the Maribyrnong explosives factory. Roys-ton F. Jensen. 25, of Glenville st., Footscray, died later in the casualty ward of the Royal Melbourne Hospital. The condition of four other men injured

was reported last night to be satisfactory

was reported last night to be satisfactory but none of them was well enough to be interviewed by investigators.

H. C. Strapp. 36, of Glenierrie rd., Maivern, and J. Ward. 16, of Auburn rd. Armadale, are in Royal Melbourne Hospital, while H. Hansford. 17, of Raleighrd., Maribyrnong, and C. Lewis, 24, of the Men's Quarters, Explosives Factory, Maribyrnong, are at the Mercy Hospital.

The men were making flares with magnesium, when suddenly the highly inflammable material ignited. The door of the hot night, and this fact alone enabled themen to escape from the inferno of flaring magnesium. Before escaping they had suffered severe burns. They ran to a guardhouse 500 yards away and there received medical attention until the ambulence arrives. ceived medical attention until the ambu-

The section of the factory in which the The section of the factory in which the fire occurred has been closed to workers pending the completion of the official inquiry by the Operational Safety Committee. Detectives and Commonwealth police are investigating, but so far ne explanation of the cause of the fire has

explanation of the cause of the me has been given.

No explosion was heard, and the interior of the hut in which the men were working was not damaged, except by slight scorching. No evidence of sabotage has been found, and police discredit any suggestion that the fire was other than an accident.

The hut was surrounded by an earthen mound to prevent a fire spreading to other huts, and only a few pounds of the explosive used was kept in the room.
