RAILWAY LINE TRACEDY.

MAN AND WOMAN RUN DOWN AND KILLED.

BODIES TERRIBLY MANGLED.

The shockingly-mangled bodies of a man and woman were found lying on the Benthat line near St. Albana last night—the seventh anniversary, by the way, of the Sunshine milway disaster. The couple had evidently been walking along the track, and were run down by the Bendizo up train after jumping aside to avoid the Bendigo down train, which was appreaching them from the apposite direction.

The bodies were removed by the cable Altera, of Samshine, shortly after \$ a clock, and were taken on to the mosque in the van attreped to the incoming Hendigo train, the driver of which had seen the man and woman famps to from of the entities when it was too like to avoid a disaster.

The woman was thrown best of the Hendigo up time, and the man was lying on. the east side of the down line. It was definitely ascertained by Alford that the Berelian up and down trains had passed the spot at 7.15, and in his report the constable expresses the opinion that noth the decreed had tried to avoid the down train and crossed in front of the up toam. Therewere algor that the bodies were carried a distance of 30 yards by the concatcher, and then thrown aside.

The man has been elemented as Walter Barres, a laborer, employed at the Albion quarties. He was about 40 years of age. and lived in Brunswick. The woman is believed to have been a widow, living at North Callton. She was about 35 years of age. On her body was found a handker-thicf marked "J. T. Rentical"

MAN AND WOMAN RILLED

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ALBION PATALITY.

VICTIMS IDENTIFIÇO.

The hodies of the min and the woman who were run over and killed by a train near Albien railway station on Monday night have been identified as those of Walter Cornwallis Davies, 28 years of age, a resident of Brunewick, and Mrs. Surah Agnes Buther, a married woman, 44 years of age, living at Edward street, Brunewick.

Mrs. Butler, whose inshand is an invalid, left home on Monday moraing to go to work, and was not seen alive again by any of her family. It is said that Davies, who was a friend of Mrs. Butler a chiest son, a man about 25 years of age, was working its quarry near Nt. Abhan, and it is thought possible that Mrs. Butler went there to see him on Monday, and that they were making their way to the station to catch a train when the tragedy occurred.

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RAILWAY FATALITY.

MAN AND WOMAN RUN OVER.

Constable Alford, of Sunshine, received information on March 24 that there were two bodies on the railway line near St. Albans. Proceeding to the spot indicated he found the mangled bodies of a woman on the west side of the Bendigo line and a man on the east side of the down line. The couple had evidently been walking along the track, and were run down by the Bendigo up train after jumping aside to avoid the Bendigo down train. which was approaching them from the opposite direction. They had been carried a distance of about 30 yards by the cowcatcher.

The bodies were taken to the Morgue and next day Mr Thomas Weaver identified that of the woman as his sister, Mrs Sarah Agnes Butler, 44, a resident of Edward street, Brunswick, and Mr Arthur Davies, of Glenlyon road, Brunswick, identified the man as his brother, Walter Cornwillis Davies, 36, and unmarried.

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
