The child who was reported to be slightly burned in last week's issue was, upon closer inspection, found to be more seriously burned, and, although treated by a doctor and admitted to a hospital, died shortly afterwards. The first report was telephoned to the "Advocate" soon after the child was taken from the fire, and before the arrival of the doctor. Great credit must be given to Mr. Harrison, who ventured into the heart of the fire, and recovered the child, aithough nearly overcome by smoke, and, more's the pity, if he had known sooner that somebody was in the house, the infant's life would have been saved.
