

QUARRYMAN DIES ON THE JOB

William George Suter, 45, a quarryman, whilst engaged, on Thursday, at about 11.55 a.m., at the Commonwealth Quarry, Sunshine, was seen to fall backwards on to some spalls. When raised by his mates he was breathing heavily and almost immediately expired. Dr Tonkin was on the scene within five minutes and pronounced life to be extinct. The body was conveyed by Constable Jarret to the morgue where a post mortem was held on Friday. Deceased, prior to the fall, according to statements made to Senior Constable Dibbs was engaged in levering out a block of stone. He was a resident of Duke Street, Braybrook, and leaves a widow and four children, with whom much sympathy is expressed. The post-mortem was carried out by Dr. Mollison, who gave it as his opinion that death was due to cerebral hemorrhage; no inquest was therefore necessary.
