

Two Dead, 3 Hurt

in Head-on Crash

GEELONG, Sunday.—Two men in a motor car were killed instantly and three other occupants were injured when the car collided with a city-bound tram during light rain about 6.30 p.m. on Saturday.

The motor car at the time was travelling north along Melbourne-road.

KILLED.—Calvert Gay, 33 years, married, Canterbury-road, Flemington.

John Gibbins, 25 years, single, Cahill-street, Richmond.

—Kenneth Williams, 24 years, High-street, Thornbury; head injuries, condition serious.

Neville Gay, 9 years, son of Mr. Calvert Gay; head injuries and fractured right leg, condition serious.

Bernard Davey, 19 years, Cardigan-street, Carlton; head and face injuries.

The train had travelled about 260 yards from North Geelong terminus when the driver observed the car approaching. He applied the brakes to the tram, which was almost stationary when the motor, a tourist, struck head on.

The motor was reduced to twisted wreckage and the front of the tram was badly damaged.

A light truck, which followed the motor, was promptly braked when the driver saw the crash, and this resulted in a car that was following crashing into the back of the truck.

No one was injured.

Four of the victims were members of Meyer's football team. They were returning to Melbourne after the team had been defeated in a match with Geelong Amateurs.

Footscray, was admitted to hospital with a lacerated forehead and lip.

Mr. Ward was killed when knocked down by a car as he was walking along Western Highway at Haven.

Mr. Lawrence Dwyer, 24 years, Robinson-street, Moonee Ponds, concussion, head and arm injuries.

Mr. Jack Kehoe, 22 years, Howe-street, South Melbourne, lacerated head and scalp.

Henry Hartan, 17 years, Barnawilma, lacerated scalp, concussion.

Two other passengers in the truck were treated at the hospital, and allowed to return to the college.
