

TWO ACCIDENTS THIS WEEK IN P.O. PLACE

IMPROVEMENTS MADE AT BLIND CORNER

The newly constructed Post Office Place has been the scene of two accidents this week, but a council gang has cut back the corners—in fact, the work was in progress before the accidents happened—to give greater vision to road users traversing the road at this point.

On Monday afternoon Ronald Iliffe Belt, of 12 Station Place, was riding a bicycle, and turning into Station Place from Post Office Place came into collision with a motor truck owned by Glenayne Bros., of Footscray. No one was injured, but the bicycle was badly smashed.

The accident that occurred on Wednesday morning was somewhat more serious. George Burt Guy, of Rupert Street, Footscray, well known as a member of the Sunshine Harvester Cricket Club and the Footscray Football Club second eighteen,

was riding pillion on a motor cycle behind Ernest G. Eddy, of 7 Donald Street, Footscray, when at the junction of Station Place and Post Office Place a motor truck struck the cycle amidships. Eddy and Guy were on their way to work at the Harvester Works, proceeding along Station Place, and the truck was turning out of Station Place.

The rider of the cycle was not in-

The rider of the cycle was not injured, apart from receiving abrasions to his legs, but Guy sustained a fractured thigh and other injuries. He was treated by Dr Fisher and conveyed by civil ambulance to the Melbourne Hospital.

The motor cycle was badly damaged.

William Gregory, of 3 Thomson Street, Sunshine, was the driver of the truck, which is owned by A. Beachley.

It is said that the rider of the motor cycle was about to overtake and pass another vehicle in Station Place near the corner, when the truck turned the corner and collided with the cycle before anything could be done to avert an accident.
